We ONLY need another 4 !!



It all started with Dad's old radio. I remember, as a young boy chasing our pet hamster as he scurried under the furniture. He would usually "escape" during the time when his cage was being cleaned. With his new-found freedom, he would explore our rambling old farm house, that was built on a bluff overlooking the flood plain of Whitewater Creek, in eastern Indiana.

It was a magical age, and with 4 of us kids there were lots of times when my parents were busy with my sibling's needs – not chasing around looking for me, or the hamster. But this was a time when <u>I</u> was to be the explorer. It was raining outside, not the kind of weather to go playing along the creek, and so this day would find me exploring the inner workings of Dad's radio.

It seems that on a previous hamster hunt, my pursuit had taken me into the dark recess of our family den. Back then, we had dens, not family rooms. In the den, children's toys shared space with the radio. Very often, we tuned the radio to programs like Amos and Andy, the Lone Ranger, or Fibber McGee and Molly. That was a long time before black and white television arrived in our house.

So there I was, in the den, suddenly remembering that I had previously caught the furry little critter as he scurried under the radio. The radio, an old FADA, stood on the floor, and it's contoured wooden case was covered with polished veneer. Even the knobs were made of shiny varnished wood. To put the controls within easy reach of an adult, wooden legs elevated the radio just high enough so that a 7-going-on- 8 year old kid could easily fit head and shoulders beneath the magical machine.

So there I lay. On my back, gazing up at all of those beautifully colored wires and parts, of which I had no understanding. But there they were, and what a visual feast. Back then, there weren't any covers on some of those radios, and you could reach up inside and TOUCH the inner workings! And I did. Several times, in fact. I'm sure you can guess what was to follow. Yes, I received a shock!

I must have thought that there were *safe* parts to touch, so touch again, I did. Pretty soon, I got zapped again! That put my curiosity at bay. At least about those beautiful parts inside the radio. But somehow, instead of being discouraged, I began to turn my curiosity toward trying to figure out just what made the old FADA "tick".

After hearing my confession of this electrifying experience, my grand parents gave me a crystal radio kit for Christmas. Having moved from rural Indiana, this was our first Christmas in Schenectady, New York. The radio came in a box that said Knight Kit. It was like a dream come true. I was about to build my very own radio. Inside the box were screws, nuts, brackets, wire, and a cylindrical paper coil form, which looked to the world like it was recycled from the bathroom! There was a big coil of enameled wire, which became a tangled mess, and curious other parts like a diode and a pair of bake-lite headphones.

I managed to get the radio built, and installed a long wire antenna. I ran the antenna wire inside through my bedroom window. The ground connection was a piece of left-over enameled wire wrapped around the valve of the steam radiator. I hooked up the headset wires, and it was time for the radio's maiden voyage. I was about to embark on a trip to many far-flung places on earth -- through the magic of radio! Not just any radio, but my radio! The radio that, I built all by myself. Not counting the help Mom gave me in untangling the rat's nest coil of wire!

And so there I was, headphones on, finally adjusted - ouch! That steel band pulls your hair – you gotta be careful! As I slowly turned the pointer knob of the tuning capacitor, I watched the shiny plates mesh, and tuned in my first station. It was WGY. Later, that night, I was able to pick up WGEO – the Voice of America station that was run by General Electric. And boy, was I hooked! More tuning, tap changing, and tweaking, brought in still more stations. Then, there was WPTR - 1540. I could now listen to MY music - rock 'n roll - and Dad could listen to the news on his old FADA. That first night I fell asleep in bed with those headphones on. By morning, when I woke, my ears really hurt from being squashed by those hard bakelite ear pieces. But I was so fascinated with my radio, I would do it again and again, night after night.

It would be a few years before I started building circuits using vacuum tubes. I would go on to build my own short wave and ham radio equipment from scratch. And I would use many of those colorful resistors and capacitors, and a rainbow of colored wires — just like those under Dad's old radio.

Vanity Call Sign Fee Poised To Drop Slightly Later This Year

The FCC wants to reduce the Fiscal Year 2006 regulatory fee to obtain an Amateur Radio vanity call sign to \$20.10 for the 10-year license term. The current vanity fee is \$21.90. The Commission proposed the new fee in a Notice of Proposed Rule Making (NPRM), "Assessment and Collection of Regulatory Fees for Fiscal Year 2006," in MD Docket 06-68, released March 27. If ordered as proposed, the new vanity fee would become effective in August or September. The FCC is obligated to collect nearly \$289 million in regulatory fees during FY 2006 to fund its operations.

Comments on the proposed fee schedule are due Friday, April 14. Reply comments are due Friday, April 21. The FCC has projected collecting \$171,188 in vanity call sign fee receipts from 8500 applications in FY 2006.

The vanity call sign fee has assumed somewhat greater significance this year as the renewal window is about to open for the first Amateur Radio licenses assigned vanity call signs in 1996. Applicants who wish to keep their post-1995 vanity call signs must pay the vanity call sign regulatory fee in effect at the time the renewal application reaches the FCC. Any Amateur Radio renewal application may only be filed within 90 days of the license expiration date.

Amateur Radio licensees holding vanity call signs granted prior to 1996 do not have to pay a regulatory fee when renewing. This is because Congress did not begin requiring the FCC to annually recover its regulatory costs until 1993. Additionally, such licensees are not specifically tagged as vanity call sign holders in the ULS.

Shack Wiring - My Winter Project

Hi Gang – My winter project was working on the new shack -- here is the way I brought in the new coax and rotator control and antenna switching lines. Pictures 1.2 and 3 show the wiring in progress. Notice the stick-on wire markers (hey, I can't remember yesterday, let alone which piece of coax goes where!) The control lines and rotor cables follow the RETMA color code used for eons to mark the values of resistors. They are connected to the real world with an AMP multi-pin plug and socket arrangement. Note the use of the low-loss jumpers from the plate to the hard-line (out of view) - hard-line used for 20 meters and up, and RG-213 or LDF 400 used for every -thing below 20 meters. Pictures 4, 5, and 6 show the final results, all buttoned up and ready for on-air testing. The large lug mounted on the coax terminating plate is used to attach auxiliary bonding and grounding cables from the ground bus which is yet to be installed. Should be "moved in" in another week!

I believe that there are other and probably better ways to do the same thing. That's just my way. Yes, the 5BTV is a Hustler Vertical - probably had it for 25 years works great. It is set up for 75,40, 20, 15 and 10 meters. (Purchased pre-WARC) The C3SS is a tri-band beam from Force 12. The Type N connectors are for the 20 meter and up feedlines. I hope to hear you all on HF one of these days.
