It Seems to Us: So Far, So Good

At the bottom of the sunspot cycle -- where we are right now -- fewer HF bands are open and the ones that are open are more crowded than usual. A large influx of new HF operators at this point in the cycle could have been a bit chaotic. In actuality their arrival has gone quite smoothly, aided by a welcoming attitude on the part of many veteran operators.

At first, Technicians and others who are new to 10 meters must have wondered why the band was "forbidden fruit" for so long. Signals of other than the local variety were pretty rare. That's normal at the bottom of the cycle. Some time spent on 10 when conditions are poor increases one's appreciation for the good times that are coming, when you will be able to work the world with low power and a modest antenna. By May the sporadic-E season had arrived, giving many Techs a chance to get started on Worked All States or simply the opportunity to get acquainted with like-minded people hundreds of miles away.

We're pleased to report that ARRL membership increased in each of the past three months and now stands at more than 151,000. The biggest contributing factor is the increase in interest and activity that is evident among the relatively large number of recent upgrades to General and Amateur Extra. If you are in this group, welcome -- or welcome back! -- and thanks for your support of Amateur Radio's national organization. A second factor is a rise in the number of new licenses being issued. While the Technician license has been avail - able without a Morse exam for the better part of a generation, it seems to be more attractive now. It's too early, though, to know whether these upward trends will last; they could just reflect pent-up demand.

One thing that's certain is that there has been no decline in the number of people wanting to learn and use the Morse code! Anyone who had feared (or hoped) that CW would wither away can put that thought aside. Demand for Morse training remains strong and on-the-air CW activity is robust. Some recent upgrades have told us that now that they don't have to learn CW they're more interested in doing so. It should be more fun for them than for their predecessors whose sole objective was to pass the 5 word-per-minute exam. If that's your only goal, you're likely to develop habits that will get in the way of developing real proficiency.

Editors Note: A perfect example of the success of the of the new No-code Format is the Students that have graduated from the last two classes from the Rip Van Winkle Amateur Radio Club.

These students were offered Morse Code as an Option because "THEY WANTED TO DO IT" not because they had to do it. This has resulted in a whole new group of Amateurs with a Love and Respect for CW. It's much easier to feed someone something when it's appetizing rather than trying to jam it down their throat. Dave – WD2K must be looking down from Heaven and smiling at the new transition.

CQIR - Ireland Calling Contest

You might be able to win a trip to Ireland. In 2007 the Irish Radio Transmitters Society (IRTS) celebrates the 75th anniversary of its founding in 1932. As part of the jubilee celebrations the Society is organizing an International Radio Contest, "CQIR - Ireland Calling". CQIR is a once-off event, with a difference - overseas entrants with 75 or more QSOs have the opportunity to win a trip to Ireland. The contest period is from 12:00 UTC Saturday 29th September 2007 to 12:00 UTC Sunday 30th September 2007. It is an everyone works everyone contest on the five contest bands and is both CW and SSB. You may work both modes or only one. CQIR celebrates the IRTS Jubilee and the "Irish" amateur- radio community worldwide. It's where the Irish, at home and abroad, work the World - and where those of Irish descent identify themselves by including their ancestral county in the exchange, for example: County Cork, County Antrim etc. Entrants are "Irish" if; they operate from Ireland, or they were born in Ireland, or have a direct ancestral link to Ireland - with no time limit. Anyone whose partner/spouse qualifies under this section can be Irish too. All other entrants are "World" entrants. My exchange will be "59 1928 Lon" as both of my parents came to the US in 1928 from County Longford, Ireland. For each and every 75 valid OSOs logged, entrants will qualify for one entry to the COIR prize draw. Two prizes will be awarded, one for entrants operating from outside Ireland, and the other for entrants operating in Ireland. For entrants operating from outside Ireland air travel to Ireland for the entrant and one other person - with accommodation for one week in Kinnitty Castle, Co. Offaly.

Troy Expands Embrace of World Without Wires

A growing WiFi network will bring free Internet access to a broader swath of city

TROY -- The city has partnered with local businesses and building owners to expand its wireless Internet network.



Troy Mayor Harry Tutunjian made the announcement Thursday on the roof of Hedley Park Place, where one of the network's radio antennas has been placed.

Cornerstone Telephone of Troy and WiFiFee of Menands helped to build the network, with 26 radios placed around the city on buildings such as Hedley Park Place, Flanigan Square, The Atrium and Rivers Edge Apartments in Green Island.

Brian Epstein, chief executive of WiFiFee, said residents and visitors to downtown can either pay for the Internet access or connect free if they agree to watch a 30-second video advertisement every two hours. The first advertiser is CR Wireless, a local cellphone company.

Epstein said the network unveiled Thursday expands on a wireless Internet system put in place last year on the riverfront. "It was really 'Let's just start somewhere,' " Epstein said of the earlier effort. A map of the network shows it

stretching from slightly north of the Collar Street Bridge south to about Congress Street. It also covers the Rivers Edge Apartments in Green Island. Epstein declined to provide an exact cost for the network.

Each radio costs several thousand dollars, but the city is paying for access to the network for communication services for its police and fire departments, and the building owners allowed use of their rooftops and also installed rooftop generators to keep the radios working in case of power failure.

Empire State Games Notebook : Hamming it up at the Games

PLEASANTVILLE -At every event and every venue over the past four days, there's been a few constants: athletes, officials, spectators ... and an amateur radio operator.

The "hams" are there to help injured athletes, using their radios for safety communications and medical-transport requests. Paula and Bob Brackett, who live outside Ithaca, headed a group of 60-70 operators, including between 20-30 Westchester residents, from their base on the Pace University campus. Last year's team put in more than 1,200 hours at the Games in Rochester.

"A lot of people think amateur radio is kind of a dinosaur. But when you see how efficiently we can communicate with other groups," said Paula.

For example, with one call on their radio, the Bracketts can shut down every field and get all the athletes out of the water if lightning is spotted in the area. And with everyone on the air at the same time, the highest priority situation takes precedence, which isn't the case with cell phones.

"If you're at ice hockey and you have an injured athlete, and I'm talking to someone who's asking for bandages, how long is it going to be before you get to talk to me?" said Bob. "With a radio, someone can interrupt right over top and say, 'We need an ambulance,' and we drop everything and take care of that."

Briarcliff Manor resident Alan Crosswell is among 400 hams who work the New York City Marathon each year. This week, he has overseen the action at cycling, volleyball, swimming and weightlifting.

"It's been great," Crosswell said. "It's just amazing seeing all the energy and all the people here."

League - Atlantic Div. Proposes Policy of No Background Checks "Except Criminal"

A major concern at this Board meeting was the topic of served agencies and background investigations. The Ad Hoc Background Investigation Committee agreed that pursuing federally recognized credentialing for Amateur Radio volunteers was critical for the Amateur Radio Emergency Service (ARES) to function. The Committee chairman, ARRL Atlantic Division Director Bill Edgar, N3LLR, proposed that the Board adopt a policy with regard to Memoranda of Understanding with the various served agencies.

The Board adopted a policy that "communications volunteers participating in ARRL-sponsored programs should not be required by served agencies to undergo background investigations of any kind," but notes that criminal background checks--performed by law enforcement agencies--are "generally acceptable." The policy continues, "It is not reasonable for a served agency to require these volunteers to consent to credit checks, mode of living investigations or investigative consumer reports. In negotiating or renegotiating Memoranda of Understanding that commit the League to provide volunteer emergency communications support, the League must be assured that these volunteers will not be required by the partner organization to consent to credit checks, mode of living investigations or investigative consumer reports."
