Filtering Your E-mail

One of the worst things about e-mail is the junk mail that seems to proliferate. It's often referred to as SPAM, despite the objections of the people at Hormel.

Many e-mail programs now have filters to kill spam. A feature often overlooked is the ability of these filters to direct mail into specific folders.

When I returned to Dallas after the Christmas holidays, I had about 400 e-mail messages. Most of these were from the RTTY reflector operated by WF1B. These weren't spam messages, they were from an e-mail reflector that I subscribe to.

I had to scan down these to read my "real" e-mail before I decided what to do with all the RTTY messages. I decided I wasn't going to do this again.

Since I use Netscape 4.5 for my e-mail, I decided to see what the filters could do. I set up

a new folder called "WF1B" and set the filter to place any message in here that had "wf1b" in the "To:" field.

This worked fine for a day or two. I then found out that several people "copied" the message to the reflector using the "CC:" field. I checked my filter and found an option to also test on this field. So, now all my messages from the RTTY reflector go directly to a separate folder which I can peruse when I have the time.

The only downside is that I get "You have mail" messages whenever a message comes into the wf1b folder. I end up checking my in box only to find there's no new message.

I haven't played with too many other mail programs, but most have some type of filtering capability.

Why not give it a try? If all else fails, you can click on Help and read the instructions! Good Luck!!

E-Mail Reflectors

a/k/a Mailing Lists

The article above mentions an e-mail reflector, also known as a mailing list. What is this?

Well, it truly is a device that reflects (re-sends) incoming mail messages to all the addresses on its mailing list.

Most reflectors have an automated method for adding or deleting your address from the list. Usually you send a "subscribe" message to the system. It responds with a confirmation message telling you what to do to actually add your address to the list. This is to prevent someone from maliciously adding you to a list.

Any message sent to the special list address is automatically re-mailed to everyone on the list.

The example mentioned above is a list for RTTY operators administered by WF1B. You can find out more about this at www.wf1b.com/maillist.html. We have reflector capability at www.n2ty.org if anyone has any ideas.

Windows98

Well, here's a few observations on the latest scheme to make Bill Gates a little richer.

Field Day 1999 Countdown

Field Chairman: Tom Remmert, N2TR/5

Well, Field Day is only five months away. This year we expect lots of activity on 10 meters. In order to take the best advantage of this, we need to come up with a good 10 meter antenna. I'm looking for some ideas (other than a dipole or a vertical). Would anyone be interested in building a 10 meter antenna? We can put a group together to accomplish this project. Some ideas include a quad or a yagi. Quads are rather easy to build using PVC pipe as supports and wire for the elements. A 3-element quad for 10 meters shouldn't be too difficult to construct. This would give us some gain and some directivity. Additionally, this will allow us to dedicate the tri-band antenna to 15/20 meters.

So, how about some volunteers to research this and come up with a plan. Here's a good opportunity to learn something about building antennas and contribute to the Field Day effort.

We still haven't made a final decision on a site for Field Day. So, there's still time to volunteer the family estate. Let me know if you have any ideas and/or suggestions.

We need to start recruiting volunteers for the following positions:

◆ Food Chairperson:

(responsible for lining up donations of food/supplies, etc.; making arrangements for the food to be picked up; drafting chefs and assistant chefs; etc.)

◆ Novice Chairperson:

(responsible for the Novice (10m) station)

◆80 Meter Chairperson:

(responsible for the 80 meter station)

◆ 40 Meter Chairperson:

(responsible for the 40 meter station)

◆ 20 Meter Chairperson:

(responsible for the 20 meter station)

◆ Bonus Points Chairperson:

(responsible for coordinating our efforts to get as many bonus points as possible)

We already have Hollins for our VHF/UHF chairman. Also, we will probably operate the 80 meter station on 15 meters during daylight hours and, possibly, the 40 meter station on 15 meters during the night,

depending on foreign broadcast QRM and band conditions.

We need everyone to pitch in and help. We can't depend on one person to get all the food, etc. If you can get a donation somewhere, please do. But, we need to coordinate the effort so we don't have three people asking the same business for donations.

We also need some computers to do the logging. If you have a laptop or desktop that you would like to loan, donate, whatever, let me know.

Along those lines, we're considering switching to the CT contest logging program this year. It is probably the most popular DOS based contest logging program around. Let me know if you have any thoughts on this.

GOVERNMENT SETS UP Y2K HOTLINE

The President's Council on Year 2000 is establishing a toll-free information line for answering consumers' queries about possible millennium problems. By dialing 1-888-USA-4-Y2K, consumers can access prerecorded messages seven days a week, 24 hours a day on how personal computers, small business, telephones and other products or services will be affected by the approaching year 2000.

John Koskinen, chairman of the council, said Thursday, "We are committed to providing consumers the latest information on how the problem may, or may not, affect government services, banks, household appliances and other things they depend upon in their daily lives,"

The information on the line comes from government agencies, companies or industry groups, reporting on what measures they are taking to prepare for 2000. That is when computer systems performing calculations involving dates may begin generating incorrect data if they recognize only the last two digits of a year because they will assume that 2000 is 1900. Information specialists supported by researchers also will be on hand to answer consumer questions from 9:00 AM to 8:00 PM EST Monday through Friday.

At the end of the month, the line will provide a "fax-on-demand" system, enabling callers to receive printed material on the Y2K problem with the touch of a button. Similar consumer information also can be obtained through the council's Web site at:

NEW CANADIAN TERRITORY GETS PREFIX

Industry Canada has announced a new amateur call sign prefix after the creation of the new Canadian territory of Nunavut. An announcement received by Radio Amateurs of Canada from Rolf Ziemann, Industry Canada Director for the Northwest Territories, says that the new prefix, VY0 (Victor Yankee Zero), becomes effective April 1, to ensure a unique identification for the new territory.

IC extends its congratulations on the creation of Nunavut and says they are delighted to assign the new distinctive callsign prefix for use by amateurs in the new territory. The existing VE8 prefix will remain in use in the western Northwest Territories.

FCC ISSUES SECOND TOWER WARNING

The FCC has issued a second warning to owners of radio antenna structures after an ambulance helicopter nearly hit an unlit radio tower that was under construction near Arcadia. Florida. This was the second similar incident in less then a month. This comes at a time when the Commission is beefing up enforcement in all areas, and forcing owners of antenna structures to comply strictly with FCC antenna tower lighting and marking rules.

The latest incident occurred on December 21, when the helicopter, on an urgent nighttime emergency call, was forced to alter its approach pattern when the pilot unexpectedly encountered a nearby unlit 500 foot antenna structure that was under construction without temporary warning lights. After being notified of this event by the helicopter company, agents of the FCC's Tampa Office investigated, confirmed that the tower was unlit, and took steps to ensure that the tower was promptly lit and that the FAA was notified. The FCC's Compliance and Information Bureau is continuing its investigation of the matter.

The FCC issued its first warning to radio antenna structure owners on November 30, 1998, after a similar incident occurred near Muleshoe, Texas. CIB Bureau Chief Richard D Lee said, "We will not tolerate non-compliance with FCC Rules. We intend to enforce these safety of life requirements to the fullest."
